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Introduction

Do you desire to truly walk by the Spirit, not giving in to the pull of the world and the flesh?

Would you like to face each day with quiet confidence and bold faith, fully prepared to cope with whatever it brings?

All this and more—all the abundance of life promised by Christ—comes with surrender, my friend.

For believers, surrendering to God is not a one-time occurrence; it's a matter of continually bowing our hearts before the Lord, laying our desire for control at His feet, and rising again to do whatever He asks us to do, through the power of the Holy Spirit. Surrender means inviting the Potter to reshape us and transform us, moment by moment, into the image of His Son, Jesus Christ. It means taking God at His word, trusting that He can and will use even our most painful circumstances for our good and His glory.

When you make a consistent practice of surrendering, inviting God to complete His good work in you no matter what it takes, you'll find your life and your relationships transformed. As you stop trying to control the direction of your life and instead allow God's Word and wisdom to guide your footsteps, you'll realize that His grace is sufficient for every encounter along the way. When you stop struggling against the frustrations of the day, choosing rather to dwell in the everlasting arms of the eternal God, you'll gain a deeper

understanding of the character of your Lord and of His un-failing, unshakable love.

While your circumstances may be difficult, even painful, through the discipline of surrender you will find God's strength perfected in your weakness. And you will be able to face each day, each moment, each opportunity and challenge with a hope that does not falter.

That's what this devotional is all about, beloved. Each brief, one-page reading addresses the challenges and joys of surrendered living and points you to unchangeable, eternal truths about your God, His Word, and His love for you. Within each devotional, you'll find a verse or two set in bold-face; these scriptures provide key thoughts on which you'll want to meditate throughout your day. You may even want to memorize these verses so you can bring them to mind and draw on their insights for encouragement and guidance.

I pray that God will use this book to strengthen and deepen your relationship with Him. May the verses from Scripture whet your appetite for His Word that it may become more precious to you than your necessary food. And in the days ahead, may you commit your way to the Lord, fully trusting Him to give you the desires of your heart.

January 1

Oh, beloved of God, wouldn't you like to know that at the end of your life—not to mention the end of this day, the end of this year—you could declare, as the apostle Paul did, **“I have fought the good fight, I have finished the course, I have kept the faith”** (2 Timothy 4:7)?

Wouldn't you like to be assured that you could experience all the difficult situations Paul faced and say in total sincerity and truth, without one drop of egotism, **“Follow me. Be an imitator of me, even as I am of Christ Jesus”** (1 Corinthians 11:1; Philippians 3:17)?

January 2

May I ask, dear one, what is on your calendar for today, for this week? In the midst of all of life's demands, have you scheduled some time to be alone with your heavenly Father, to hear His words to you?

I believe it's absolutely crucial that you and I slow our pace and discipline our time in order to be in the Word of God on a daily basis. Why? Because when we're not in the Word—reading it through consistently—we forget who our God is and what He expects and requires. We have a tendency to rationalize our humanity and forget His holiness.

We lose our perspective of eternity and become ensnared in the temporal. We lose the burning, overriding passion fueled by truth that brings our flesh into subjection. We lose the heart-desire to be holy, to please God, to be perfect even as our heavenly Father is perfect. We lose that driving inner hunger for righteousness, which comes in those quiet moments of meditation as we sit at the feet of the Most High God in prayer and adoration.

Solomon eloquently expressed the importance of our spending time in God's Word: **“My son, give attention to my words.... Keep them in the midst of your heart. For they are life to those who find them, and health to all their body”** (Proverbs 4:20–22).

How can you be sure to keep God and His Word in the midst of your heart today?



Father, give me a hunger and passion not only to read Your life-giving words but also to use them as my guide for every decision, opportunity, or challenge I face today.

January 3

Are you wrestling today with the uncertainties of life, struggling to find a solid footing for your faith?

Oh, friend, let me assure you that no matter what changes are occurring in your life, in your job, in your family, in your nation, there is always one stabilizing factor upon which you can rest: your God. He is the immovable Rock. You can hide in Him.

God is from everlasting to everlasting—the beginning and the end (Revelation 21:6). He always has been, and He always will be. The prophet Habakkuk prayed, “**Are You not from everlasting, O LORD, my God, my Holy One?**” (1:12).

If He is eternal, then all things find their beginning and end in Him. “All things came into being through Him, and apart from Him nothing came into being that has come into being” (John 1:3). “For from Him and through Him and to Him are all things” (Romans 11:36).

One thing will always remain: God. And because He is immutable—unchanging—He will always be the same, and He will never leave you nor forsake you (Hebrews 13:5).

He is always there with arms opened wide, your everlasting Father God.

May I suggest you take a few minutes to meditate on the fact that no matter what else in your life may change, God will not. He can bring stability to your life. Claim that in faith.
